ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Curriculum

Galloway students pursue a college preparatory curriculum in a school year divided into two semesters; students take at least six courses per semester. Class sizes range from six to 18 with an average size of 12.

All courses are college preparatory by design and content. Requirements by discipline include:

Advanced Placement Courses

Galloway offers a rigorous academic program and, as such, **no courses are designated as honors.** However, in keeping with the school's philosophy of encouraging students to seek challenges, Galloway provides students the opportunity to enroll in A.P. courses, with permission from the appropriate academic department.

EVALUATION SYSTEM

At Galloway, distinctions are drawn for individuals rather than between individuals. Written evaluations assess the degree to which a student has mastered the skills, concept, and content of the course. The following designations are used to indicate mastery:

- Mastery with excellence
- **G Good mastery** 89-80 3.0
- S Satisfactory mastery 79-73 2.0
- Marginal mastery 72-70 1.0
- U Unsatisfactory mastery 69-0 0.0

Grade Point Average

- On a 4.0 scale
- A.P. courses earn 1 additional point
- Includes only Galloway and Global Online Academy courses
- Beginning in 2021, a final grade is issued for all courses. For year-long classes, the final grade is based on the average of fall and spring semester grades
- GPA in 2021 and beyond is based upon final grades only

Rank in Class The Galloway School does not rank its students.
